

ROXY COMMUNITY THEATRE OFFICIAL RE-OPENING

STAGE 1







The Roxy Community Theatre was first opened on 7 April 1930, the vision of developer and first proprietor, Mr George Conson. His "Palace of Dreams" was designed by noted architectural firm Kaberry and Chard in a modified Art Deco style with Art Noveau and Spanish Mission elements, and this (now) State heritage listed building with its prominent neon lighting continues to stand proud in the centre of Leeton's central business district. The stage was added in 1933 with Miss Gladys Moncrieff OBE engaged to sing as part of the opening celebrations.

In 1977, the future of the Roxy was threatened with redevelopment of the site, prompting the community to undertake a massive fundraising drive to "Save The Roxy" which contributed \$27,000 towards the \$75,000 purchase price. The Theatre was vested in the Council and successfully run by a Roxy Management Committee for almost three decades during which the facilities were progressively updated before management reverted to Council in 2005. In addition to showing films and being a popular meeting place, the Roxy became the venue for eisteddfods, discos, speech nights and the musical society's annual production.

In 2016, under the watchful care of Council's Roxy Advisory Committee, a range of non-compliances were identified at the Roxy - from health and safety, to accessibility issues, and technical limitations. In planning how to address these, user groups were consulted and it soon became very apparent that the facility needed to become more versatile if it was to deliver fully on the community's aspiration "to be open for business in new and exciting ways". The first re-designs put to the community in 2017/18, on the existing footprint, were resoundingly rejected on the grounds that the heritage fabric of the auditorium should not be altered in any way. In response, Council instead acquired the shops next door which were better able to accommodate the new dressing rooms, two lifts, café/bar, function kitchen, new bathrooms and the Roxy2 theatrette (soon to be completed).

Stage 1 of the Roxy redevelopment was completed in December 2024 which also includes structural strengthening of the walls and stage, new roofing, a new flat floor auditorium, retractable seating, new seats in the dress circle, a fresh and luxurious coat of paint, increased technical capability, improved acoustics with hearing augmentation, and front door / dress circle access for all. Stage 2, including the Roxy 2 Theatrette, will commence in the coming months with Growing Regions funding secured, matched by Council.

While the building is a magnificent and multifunctional vessel, the Roxy's true richness is in what is produced and enjoyed on site, including how it strengthens community, boosts creativity and activates our local economy. There will be something for everyone, including high quality theatre, musical and cultural activity (local and touring); a range of cinema (including first releases); a variety of events (civic, community and conferences); world class vocational training in the performing arts; and a welcoming meeting place that brings people together, builds community and leaves us all inspired.

Message from the Mayor, Deputy Mayor and General Manager

On behalf of Leeton Shire Council, the Roxy Redevelopment Committee and the Roxy Redevelopment Project Control Group, we are delighted to welcome you to the grand re-opening of our beautiful Roxy Community Theatre.

Over many workshops and meetings, user-groups and the public were generous in sharing their thoughts and ideas for shaping a refreshed vision for the Roxy. Together we settled on a design that is beautiful, modern, accessible and multi-functional, while strongly conserving the important heritage values of this iconic building.

Our community set the direction for the Roxy "to be open for business in new and exciting ways".

Delivery had a few ups and downs through the COVID period, with Council eventually taking on the role of Principal Contractor itself in 2023. Our brilliant Project Management Office was ably served by the indomitable Project Director Katherine Herrmann (in large part voluntary), Project Manager Gideon Vos, Construction Manager Peter Salisbury and Site Manager Shaun Deaton who, as a team, professionally navigated all the surprises that a heritage building can reveal and secured over 47 trade packages to bring the vision to life. Our thanks to them, the Roxy Redevelopment Committee, and also our insurer - Statewide Mutual - who walked every step of the way with us.

Tonight we also recognise and thank Williams Boag Architects, our Quantity Surveyors DCWC; a wide range of consulting engineers and building inspectors; Council teams (WHS, IT, Water, Roads, Planning); and, most importantly, the many trades who took plans on paper and turned them into reality. We especially acknowledge our incredible local Leeton trades - and those from Narrandera and Griffith - whose combined skills and expertise have delivered a truly regionally significant project of which we can all be proud.

Of course, the redevelopment dream was only made possible through the generous support of our funders. Our sincere thanks to the NSW Government (\$6.2M) and Australian Government (\$1M) for contributing over half of the costs for Stage 1 and getting behind the vision for the Roxy.

Ahead of tonight's opening, we had the amazing support of many community groups who assisted with the Commissioning Phase of Stage 1, through the "Community First Program". Their assistance with testing the facility has been invaluable, as has been the incredible input and support of the Roxy "Dream Team" of volunteers (88 at last count) led by the ever-inspirational Sue Gavel.

So, here we are, celebrating the completion of Stage 1 with a grand re-opening of our Roxy Community Theatre by enjoying a range of performances from Leeton's 'best of the best', many of whom honed their skills on the Roxy stage in their youth. Our very own Jake Speer has directed tonight's spectacular, with Council's Emma Di Muzio (supported by a small, wonderful team) having done a fine job as producer. Our thanks to all, including some special Roxy friends, noting many have travelled to Leeton to share their brilliance on this auspicious occasion.

Thank you for sharing this incredible grand-opening evening with us. To the artists we say "break a leg" and to the audience we say "enjoy and be inspired by the spirit of Leeton Roxy Community Theatre".

In 1906, The Story of the Kelly Gang became the first feature-length film ever released —a groundbreaking achievement that marked the beginning of an entirely new art form. Just five years later, in 1911, Nestor Studios became Hollywood's first film studio, setting the stage for what would become the global entertainment industry. And in 1912, just one year after Hollywood's foundation, Leeton was gazetted — a town built on its own dream, formed as the centrepiece of the ambitious Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area.

Less than two decades after, in the midst of the Great Depression, a young Greek immigrant named George Conson arrived in Leeton with a vision. At a time when the world was gripped by uncertainty, he dared to dream of something extraordinary. He looked at this young town — still in its infancy — and envisioned a grand theatre, a place of wonder, a *Palace of Dreams*.

For nearly a century, the ROXY has stood as a testament to the power of dreams. It has been more than a building — it has been a sanctuary, a place where reality gives way to possibility, where the boundaries of time and space dissolve, and where audiences can lose themselves to the magic of possibility. Whether through film, live performance, music, or dance, the ROXY has provided a stage for dreams to be shared, celebrated, and brought to life.

This concert is more than a re-opening— a statement of intent that the ROXY is not simply returning to what it once was, but stepping boldly into the future. Tonight's performance is a dream itself— one that invites us to acknowledge the past, glimpse the future, and revel in the present.

Tonight, we are stepping into a dream and making it real.

This theatre has always been more than bricks and mortar—it is a factory for the imagination, a place to test ideas, share stories, and explore what it means to be human. And like any great institution, it has required vision, dedication, and unwavering belief to bring it back to life. How much talent discovered, memories made and new dreams born from within the walls of this Palace of Dreams.

Tonight, we acknowledge the dreams of the past and wait - with baited breath - for the dreams of the future to visit us. When they do, let us listen. Let us embrace them. And above all, let us be bold enough to make them real.
















The Roxy Lights


